Dear friends,

I was speaking with a friend this week who said they were feeling a bit flat. They didn't have much energy, were finding it difficult to concentrate and to make simple choices or decisions. I wonder if you have sometimes been feeling the same recently. We've all been living in a long health crisis so we will all feel some strain. Many of us are already living with long term medical need and the pandemic has only made treatment more difficult to access or much-needed operations postponed.

We can all look forward to more uplifting times this summer. Already it has been good to welcome people back into our homes and to begin to share more time outside (where possible and when it hasn't been raining!). I reminded my friend that life will feel a bit more normal again in June.

But what is it that will truly lift our spirits?

A good chat with a friend, going on a bike-ride together, sharing a meal, catching up with children and grandchildren. What do all these have in common? Connection. Connection with others, being recognised and appreciated as a friend, family member or colleague. A bit like an electrical circuit, our spirits are made to be connected.

Which is why the gift of God's Spirit is so important. God's Spirit connects us with God, helps us to recognise Jesus as our friend and saviour and reassures us that we are God's children.

We see the effect of God's Spirit all through the Bible, but especially at the time of Pentecost. Jesus' friends were 'all gathered in one place', waiting and praying. As they were waiting, God pours out His Spirit on them, which to them is like a great wind and like tongues of flame touching each one. They experience the power of God and the love of God. The Spirit connects God and His people.

I hope you have had similar experiences, which are often beyond words. The experience of being completely overawed by God's power is like a rushing wind. Wind blows the cobwebs away, clears the atmosphere, creates a new climate. God's breath provides us with life and allows us to look at things in a new way.

The experience of God's love is also like a fire. Warming us up from the inside, bringing a crackling light into the darkness of our hearts. The action of the Holy Spirit can also be like a cleansing fire, burning away what is impure or not useful, refining and strengthening who we are.

And the gift of God's Spirit leads to new connections with others. The people at the first Pentecost suddenly found themselves outside, talking with people from all sorts of different backgrounds.

In this newsletter you'll see a gentler expression of that first Pentecost in the update from the Knitting Group. In it we still see God's power and love at work, warming people's hearts, and connecting them with people on the other side of the world.

There will be growing opportunities this summer to connect and re-connect with people. Let us allow our connection with God to raise our spirits and to help us look outward.
